Dr. Alex Gonzalez is the Medical Director at Fenway Health, where he oversees a staff of over 80 physicians, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, nurses, medical assistants, and clerical staff in the delivery of medical care to Fenway's approximately 30,000 patients – half of whom are LGBT, including 3000 transgender patients and over 2000 people living with HIV/AIDS. Alex obtained a Bachelor of Science in Biology from Tulane University and a combined medical and public health degree from the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine. He completed his internship and residency training in Primary Care Internal Medicine at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. He is currently an Instructor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School, and he has worked at Fenway since 2005. In 2016, Dr. Gonzalez was the recipient of the Outstanding Massachusetts Community Health Center Physician Award. He is designated as an HIV Specialist by the American Academy of HIV Medicine.
