


ILLINOIS: ASIAN AMERICANS, NATIVE HAWAIIANS & PACIFIC ISLANDERS

DID YOU KNOW...


- Illinois has 428,213 Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) residents, making up 4% of the state's total population.
- During the past decade, Illinois' AAPI population grew 50% from approximately 285,000 to 428,000. Its Asian population** grew 71%, and its Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander population** grew 337%.
- Illinois' largest AAPI ethnic group is Asian Indian, followed by Filipino and Chinese†† (see table right).
- The AAPI populations in Illinois with the fastest growth rate are Pacific Islander†††, Asian Indian, Vietnamese, Chinese††, and Filipino (see table below).
- Asian Human Services, located in Chicago, is one of AAPCHO's 19 member community health centers serving over 4,600 AAPI patients (2003 UDS).

82% of Illinois' AAPIs age five and older speak a language other than English at home. Of these, 42% rated their ability to speak English as less than "very well."

FOREIGN-BORN

1.5 million of Illinois' residents were foreign-born, approximately 306,000 or 20% of which are from Asia. India, the Philippines, China, Korea, and Pakistan were among the countries with the most migrants.

TERMINOLOGY

"Asian" refers to people having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, or the Indian subcontinent, including Chinese, Filipino, Japanese, Asian Indian, Korean, Vietnamese, Cambodian, Laotian, Thai, and others.

People having origins in any of the original peoples of Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands are referred to as "Pacific Islander," including Polynesian, Samoan, Tongan, Micronesian, Guamanian or Charmorro, Melanesian, Fijian, and Other Pacific Islander not specified. Those persons having origins in the original people of Hawaii are referred to as "Native Hawaiian." Unless indicated, "Pacific Islander" includes Native Hawaiians.

"White" refers to people having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

The data for different censuses are not directly comparable due to changes made to each census; thus caution must be used when interpreting changes in racial composition over time. For instance, the 2000 Census incorporated more race categories, modified existing categories, and offered respondents the option to mark one or more races.
