

ELECTION 2012 WHAT'S AT STAKE: PRESIDENTIAL HEALTH CARE PROPOSALS

Access to health care remains a top concern for many Americans, including Asian Americans & Native Hawaiians and Other Pacific Islanders (AA&NHOPIs). The recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling on the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) upheld the constitutionality of the law, including a requirement for most Americans to have health insurance by 2014. This document summarizes the health care proposals and stances of two of the Presidential candidates—the Democratic nominee, Barack Obama, and the Republican nominee, Mitt Romney. President Obama's stances are pulled from the ACA and Mitt Romney's stances are from his campaign proposals. This document only considers the candidate's positions on private insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, and women's health care.

PRIVATE INSURANCE: Currently, 71% of AA&NHOPIs are covered by private insurance plans.	 Today, the ACA eliminates lifetime limits on health coverage provided by private insurance plans and allows an estimated 97,000 AA&NHOPI young adults, up to age 26, to stay enrolled under their parent's plan. Beginning in 2014, insurance companies will be prohibited from discriminating against people with pre-existing conditions. Individuals will be required to purchase health insurance or pay a fine, starting in 2015. 	 Proposes to repeal the ACA, which would eliminate health insurance coverage for an estimated 2 million AA&NHOPIsⁱⁱ who would have received insurance coverage and would lift regulations on health insurance companies under the law. Supports providing coverage for people with pre-existing conditions who have had continuous coverage.ⁱⁱⁱ
MEDICAID: 1.7 million AA&NHOPIs currently receive coverage through Medicaid. Community health centers also rely on Medicaid reimbursements as a significant source of revenue.	• The ACA seeks to expand the Medicaid program to all individuals with incomes up to 133% of the Federal Poverty Level with the federal government paying 100% of the expansion for the first three years and 90% thereafter.	with a fixed block grant, capping Medicaid spending at 2011 levels, adjusted for inflation. • Does not support expanding

MEDICARE:

Medicare is an important public health insurance program for the low income, elderly and infirm.

- The ACA created \$716 billion in savings by cutting payments to Medicare Advantage plans.
- By 2010, savings per traditional beneficiary were estimated to rise to \$649 and \$2,217 in prescription drug savings for a Medicare Part D beneficiary. vi
- gained coverage under the program's expansion, can receive health care at hospital emergency rooms.
- Proposes to rescind the payment cuts, thereby eliminating the Medicare savings under the ACA.

WOMEN'S HEALTH:

Women's reproductive health has become a major issue for AA&NHOPI women in this election.

- Currently, new insurance plans are required to cover certain women's preventive care without cost to the individual and maintains funding for Planned Parenthood.
- Maintains existing prohibitions on federal funding for abortions.^{vii}
- Proposes to repeal the ACA, eliminating the Women's Health Amendment, and supports a ban on abortions with exceptions for the mother's life, rape, and incest.
- Has also stated support to end funding of Planned Parenthood and reversing Roe v. Wade. viii
